

Braeburn

(Semi-dwarf) This chance seedling found in New Zealand in the 1950s hit American shores in the 1980s and became a fruit stand classic for its great taste, crispness and long keeping ability. Unfortunately, it has not been readily available to the home fruit landscaper. That's too bad because it is a great Apple to grow but with a couple of quirks. While it is a mid-season bloomer that can be pollinated by many other Apple selections, Braeburn is one of the latest Apples to mature with the fruit taking into early to mid-fall to fully ripen. Braeburn also will flower like crazy as a youth but it will keep you waiting a couple seasons longer than most Apples to bear considerable fruit. These two quirks aside, you will find Braeburn to be the Apple of your eye featuring outstanding taste whether fresh or cooked, crisp, tart flesh, great storage ability and a multi-use nature that will keep your fruit hungry family begging for more!

Cortland

Semi-dwarf. 'Cortland' is a bright red, medium-sized apple bred from 'McIntosh' and a later maturing variety. The result is a crisp, slightly tart apple of high quality that ripens late season or late September in Zone 5. Blooms mid-season. An excellent all purpose apple developed at the Geneva Experimental Station in New York state.

Zones: 4-8

**Fuji**

Semi-dwarf. A crisp and juicy apple that ripens in October and keeps very well in storage. The flesh is sweet and crisp and the light green skin with red blush is very attractive. Vigorous and productive, this variety was developed in Japan and it's outstanding for fresh eating. Pollinate with any mid-season blooming apple.

Zones: 5-8



Granny Smith

One of the best cooking apples, Granny Smith has crisp, tart and juicy fruit with a good balance of acids and sugars. Medium-sized apples have pale to medium green skin with distinctive whitish dots. Requiring only 400 to 500 winter chill hours, and a longer season to ripen, this variety is favored in mild winter areas.


H: 15-20" W: 15-20" Zones: 5-8



Honeycrisp

Semi-dwarf. Great for taste and even better for storage, this sweet-flavored late season selection retains its crispness even after seven months of storage! 'Honeycrisp' is not only becoming an orchard favorite, it is becoming a must-have tree for the home fruit garden because of its versatility, taste and productivity as well as its remarkable ability to stay crisp for months.

Zones: 3-8



Macoun

Semi-dwarf. A favorite New England variety, this mid-season apple needs no introduction. Exceptionally high quality fruit are dark red and firm. Considered by many the best overall apple for fresh eating. Midseason bloom.

H: 12-15' W: 12-15' Zones: 4-8



McIntosh

Semi-dwarf. This apple has been around for 125 years and is still one of the most popular apples in the northeast. A very productive tree which yields medium-sized, bright red fruit with green background. With a tender, thin skin, these apples are good for fresh eating or cooking. Blooms mid-season and is self-fertile.

H: 12-15' W: 12-15' Zones: 4-8



Red Delicious

Semi-dwarf. Everyone loves 'Red Delicious', with its juicy and very sweet flesh. Good for fresh eating and salads. Blooms mid season and also ripens mid season. A vigorous growing tree. Resistant to fireblight and cedar rust.

Zones: 5-8



Gala

Semi-dwarf. A deep red apple with sweet, crisp flesh that is perfect for both eating or cooking. Matures two weeks earlier than 'Red Delicious' and blooms in mid-season.

Zones: 4-8
